"Only let your manner of life be worthy of the gospel of Christ" (Philippians 1:27a)

As Christians our manner of life springs from a well of inner conviction about who God is and who we are. What kind of heart attitude – or manner of life, as Paul puts it – would be appropriate for us to embrace, as ones who have received the Gospel of Christ? I would like to suggest that high on our list of desirable attitudes should be a grateful heart.

The Scriptures show us the unfortunate contrasts in the attitudes of God's people. The nation of Israel, jubilant at one moment because of their deliverance from slavery in Egypt, is murmuring against God only a short time later. The workers in the market place are overjoyed to have found a day's work in the vineyard. By the end of the day, however, they feel the owner has

treated them unfairly. In both cases the people of God have enjoyed God's deliverance, God's love, and God's provision. Regrettably, they lack a grateful heart. It is woefully easy for us to forget all the good gifts that God has given us. We have a unique ability to center our minds on the negative and concentrate on what we don't have.



What is the route away from this angry, accusing manner of life? We need look no further than the Psalms. The Psalmist writes, "The Lord is faithful in all his words, and gracious in all his deeds. The Lord upholds all who are falling, and raises up all who are bowed down" (Psalm 145: 13b, 14). When we are assailed by thoughts that accuse God, we need to remember the gifts and the grace of God that have always filled our lives. Praising God will help to lift us out of the pit we dig in our times of self-pity. Somehow remembering and rehearsing who God is helps us to remember who we are – beloved children of a loving and gracious Father. Join me my beloved brothers and sisters in saying "Praise God from whom all blessings flow!"

Prayer: Lord, you have always provided for all that I have needed. Grant me a grateful heart, a heart that is always ready to acknowledge your goodness and love. Amen.



GOD IS GOOD ALL THE TIME

A charter bus carrying Concordia College Alabama football players caught fire September 21st after a tire blew out on Alabama Highway 219. It was on its way to a game against Miles College in Fairfield, Al. No football players were injured; but, all of the team's equipment was destroyed in the blaze. A Volunteer Fire Department spokesman said the fire started on the

rear drivers-side. "It was still flamed up when we got there . . . [the bus] is completely destroyed."

After losing all its uniforms and equipment, \$90,000 worth, the Concordia-Selma football team received a shipment of replacement equipment and apparel from Adidas, a sports apparel company. Adidas supplied



them with 15 to 20 boxes full of jerseys, pants, shoes, gloves and pads. Many of the players' personal belongings such as cell phones and MP3 players stored in a bin on top of the bus went up in flames.

In the days since the incident, the team has drawn closer and others have been drawn to it, donating everything from shoulder pads to girdles. "It's amazing, as a coach, you know, at first, you're sitting there and you're thinking, 'Oh gosh, your whole program's shut down," Concordia Coach Lee said. "But now you're starting to see it's more of a country (national) thing now. I've had phone calls from New Jersey, New York. I get goosebumps. You look around and you say, 'People don't care.' The Southern District Mission Center in Slidell, La., was host to the annual conference for the Administrative Assistants to LCMS District Presidents September 23rd to September 26th. This was the first time that the conference met at a district office. Usually, the conference is held in St. Louis at the International Center. Thirty-three districts were represented; two of the districts sent two representatives.



The purpose of these conferences is to learn updates to current human resource systems using the software program FileMaker Pro. Other information from various synod departments is shared with the group. The Rev. Dr. Lane R. Seitz is the mentor of the group. He is the former Minnesota South District President and currently serves as Information and

Technology Consultant to the Council of Presidents of The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod. A centralized database for Pastor Information Forms (PIF) and Self-Evaluation Tools (SET) was the main topic of discussion.



As always, those in attendance enjoyed the camaraderie of those who work in the same position in their offices. The sharing of helpful ideas is a real plus. This conference is always a valuable networking tool.

On Monday (9/23) "Newbies" were in training, while others did some touring in New Orleans. Tuesday morning Southern District President opened with the devotion, *Prayers for Peace*. OUR STEWARDSHIP OF HIS RESOURCES

THE GENEROSITY MONK VISITS NORTHERN LOUISIANA

BIBLICAL PRINCIPLE Are you tired of encouraging your congregation members to tithe and finding yourself continually frustrated? Or do you shy away from the topic altogether? Perhaps it's time to focus on the biblical principle of generosity, a fruit of the Spirit, rather than the tithe that our self-righteous sinful hearts can easily turn into a legalistic attempt at "pleasing" Testimony + Time + Talent + Treasure God.



GENEROSITY MONK Dr. Gary Hoag, whom I met at our LCMS stewardship conference last February, where he was the keynote speaker, found time to visit our dual Circuit conference here in northern Louisiana earlier this month. He uses the handle "the generosity monk" and you can find out more about him and the books that he has authored at his website: <u>generositymonk.com</u>.

FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT Gary pointed out that Galatians 5:22 refers to generosity as a fruit of the Spirit, although it is usually translated "goodness." So with the understanding that generosity is actually a fruit of the Spirit, we were able to explore a Christ-centered love and trust approach to the stewardship of our financial blessings.

THE PURSE Of course, you and I know that stewardship includes all of our gifts. I would suggest, however, that we often use this truth as an excuse to avoid the topic of a God-pleasing use of money altogether. Jesus was not afraid to speak of it and neither was Paul. I remember hearing a quote from Luther in which he said the last thing to be converted in a person's life is "the purse."

GOSPEL CALL So the conference was challenging; not in a "you must obey" approach but as a Gospel call to a deeper trust in Christ. After all, he can't be trusted!

FOUR SHIFTS FOR GRACE-FILLED, SPIRIT-LED GENEROSITY

THE FIRST SHIFT...that we need to experience through the working of the Spirit is changing our focus from "law to love". The Spirit wishes to release believers from legalistic approaches to all parts of our life in Christ (Galatians 5:1).

THE NEXT SHIFT....in this "freeing" process is from a focus on "percentage giving" to "participation" in the ministry and mission of Christ's church. Interestingly, you will find that the only time Jesus uses the concept of "tithe," He is confronting the self-righteous who tithe even on their "mint and spice" while neglecting mercy and justice. Their sin was one of pride in which they could simply too hectic hiding off their list of things they needed to do to please God. The scriptural approach frees the Christian to participate in God's mission because God has blessed us so freely.

OBLIGATION TO OPPORTUNITY...... Following closely on the heels of this concept is the shift from "obligation to opportunity." This is a change in the Christian's frame of mind from "I got two" to "I get to." Certainly this shift would only be possible through the Gospel, as with all the others.

CHANGING OUR FOCUS..... The fourth shift Gary believes the Spirit wants to bring about in our life and our approach to generosity is changing our focus from the earthly to the eternal parentheses (Galatians 6:8 -10).

GENEROSITY PRINCIPLES...... The seminar continued with an exploration of generosity principles from the Old Testament, the Gospels, and the early church. Of course, Gary pointed out that it is important to avoid harping on the topic of financial generosity in particular sermons but he encouraged weaving the topic into most of our sermons and teaching. Jesus had no trouble appealing to us in this area of where true treasures are found and it would be a shame to avoid this topic and deprive our hearers of a great area of joy in their life. After all, have you ever met a grumpy generous person?

SOUTHERN DISTRICT LUTHERAN SCHOOLS

Lutheran schools and early childhood ministries are mission outposts. 16 school ministries in the Southern District have filed their 2013-2014 to date. Preschools report reported 15.8% of the students as having no church membership. For reporting schools, this figure stands are 20.5%. It is highly probable that the percentages are much higher as a family may list a church membership but are not actively participating in worship or church activities. Mission outposts establish specific strategies to build and to strengthen relationships in sharing Jesus.

Educator of the Year Award – The Southern District annually gathers nominations for four categories of educators. The time has arrived to once again exercise your privilege of nominating a fellow faculty member or fellow educator in the Southern District as the **Educator of the Year for 2013**. We encourage each school/early childhood center to make sure that it provides at least one nominee for consideration. The nomination process is open to coworkers, parents, and congregation members. The deadline for nominations is November 20, 2013.

National Lutheran School Accreditation (NLSA) - St. Paul's Lutheran – Cullman, AL (Laurie Ninke – principal) hosted a site visit for accreditation on October 13-15. The site visit team was chaired by Cal Behrens (St. Paul – New Orleans). The team members were Monica Naatz (Grace – Huntsville); Nancy Neuendorf (St. Paul – Decatur); Josh Swartz (Grace – Huntsville), and Malinda Yarbrough (Sacred Heart – Cullman). NLSA is designed to encourage school ministries to participate in ongoing school ministry improvement. The District NLSA Commissioner is Donna Behnken.

Revitalization / Transformation

I recently heard a statistic that 10% of conference participants can run with information and implement in their own setting. 50% choose to do nothing with what was heard or presented. 40% will do something if they have a have a coach/mentor or support group. Conferences generally will not produce a turnaround.

TCN offers options for coaching along with some tools for revitalization/transformation. As we are



approaching a new calendar year, congregations can choose to use the Hinge Survey Assessment Survey for planning and setting goals. TCN offers the opportunity for pastors/churches in the TCN process to participate in the Hinge Factors Assessment Survey. Through participating in

this assessment, the congregation receives insightful feedback on how your congregants score the pastor and their congregation on the 8 Hinge Factors, which have been confirmed statistically to impact your effectiveness in outreach to the community. The cost of the survey ranges from \$150-\$200, depending on average worship attendance.

Information is power, and the goal is to empower the pastor and congregation to reach your community with the Gospel. The Church Assessment will help you understand your strengths and how to capitalize on them, while learning how to build up the areas where improvement is needed.

Coaching is a vital part of helping your congregation to make the transformation to becoming more effective at sharing the Gospel with those who need to know Christ. The Church Assessment will be an invaluable tool for you and your coach, as you work together to build skills and sharpen focus while strengthening accountability!

How it works: Your church members (minimum of 30 depending on the number of your regular worship attendance) take a 10-15 minute online survey. Paper surveys may be ordered as well. When the surveys are completed and the assessment is finished, you will receive a diagnostic assessment which will give you insights on how you are doing in each of the 8 hinge factors. You will also see how your results compare to the average scores of other churches in the TCN process. Click <u>here</u> for more information and how to order the TCN Hinge Survey Assessment Survey.

Here is another option for consideration: We are reminded of the changing seasons as we enter into the Fall season. Want to explore on another intentional means to lead your congregation through a process of transformation, click <u>here</u> to learn more about this two-year process that uses four different seasons to discover how to open doors to the community.
