# EASTER TEARS

Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" John 20:15

I have discovered that my eyes tear up at movies more often than they used to. Perhaps, it is that I am just getting older and closer to heaven. Recently I noticed there are actually three kind of scenes that bring a lump to my throat and make my eyes well up. The first are quite sad, others are actually quite happy, and a third kind is neither sad nor happy, but scenes brimming with nostalgia. My reaction in all three cases suggested that I was more than a distant observer. I was there.

There is a tradition within the church which considers tears to be a gift of God, and the shedding of tears an expression of some of our deepest affections for God -- repentance, longing, joy, love. When something (or someone) touches our lives, deeply enough to cause us to cry, we know that more than our mind is engaged in the relationship. In some way, we have given over our hearts. This was surely the case with Mary Magdalene. Her early morning search for Jesus was driven by a love which could not let him go, even in death. We can only imagine the sorrow which had torn at her soul as she watched her Lord suffer and die (*Mark 15:40*). Finding that his tattered body, placed in the tomb so carefully two nights before, was now absent from its resting place, must have broken her heart. Of course she wept. She was no distant observer. Jesus was her life, her love.

We have heard the Easter message probably more times than we can count. The risk of such familiarity, of course, is that the resurrection of Jesus Christ becomes a 'matter-of-fact" announcement. We were not there, nor can we recreate the event no matter how many times it has been scripted and acted. Are we simply distant observers? I think not. On this Easter, let us recall that Jesus has taken over our hearts. Let us remember that we have met this Person, that sometimes we wish he were here by our side, and that we know he is alive. And, if anyone wonders why eyes well up as we hear the Gospel readers proclaim: "Now on the first day of the week," or as we sing: "Jesus Christ is risen today," we can tell them, "Because this is all about my Lord."

Prayer: Dear Jesus, thank you that I am not a distant observer of Easter and for the gift that allows me to express the depth of your love for me. Amen.

# The First Rosa

You've heard of the 1950s civil rights legend Rosa Parks, but have you heard about the other Rosa? The "first" Rosa was born in 1890 in a small town in rural Alabama. God blessed Rosa J. Young with an extraordinary passion for helping others and educating children. Rosa was known by many in the LCMS as the "Mother of Black Lutheranism."

With the help of God, Rosa was blessed to establish many educational opportunities for the African American community in central Alabama. In collaboration with the LCMS Board of the Evangelical Lutheran Synodical Conference at the suggestion of the Honorable Booker T. Washington, Rosa was influential in establishing and promoting 30 Lutheran elementary schools and 35 Lutheran congregations in Alabama's "Black Belt." Her legacy is unparalleled as an educator, confessor and church planter for Christ and His Church.

# 2015 Southern District Youth Service Project

Southern District youth will be joining the Appalachia Service Project (http://www.asphome.org) which provides one of the most rewarding structured service opportunities in the nation, bringing thousands of volunteers from around the country to rural Central Appalachia in Tennessee to repair homes for low-income families. After a few days of hard work repairing homes with ASP, your hands will grow a little tougher, your arms a little stronger and your relationship with God a whole lot deeper. Pastor Chris Brynestad from the Southern District will serve as our chaplain, providing spiritual growth and guidance.



When: July 5-11, 2015.

**Ages:** Youth:14 –18 years. Adults:21 years or older. ASP requires 2 adults for each 5 youth. Congregations are encouraged to partner to meet the minimum youth/adult ratios.

**Project Details:** We will be doing home repair. All tools are provided. Groups will be divided into a maximum of 7 in a work crew (2 adults minimum, 5 youth). Each crew must have a vehicle capable of transporting work crew, tools, supplies, coolers, etc.

Cost: \$310 per person. A \$50 deposit will be required at time of application. Initial applications and deposits must be received by Wednesday, April 15. The balance must be paid by Friday, May 1. We must meet ASP's 50 person minimum by this date. Registration costs cover: lodging, 3 meals per day, construction materials, tools, supplies, and customized evening programming and entertainment. Congregations are encouraged to work together to reduce transportation costs as transportation is NOT included.

#### ST. PAUL - NEW ORLEANS CELEBRATES 175 YEARS!



In 1840, St. Paul Lutheran Church was organized to meet the needs of a growing German population in the Third District of New Orleans, initially meeting in a firehouse on Chartres Street. God, however, had grander plans and St. Paul quickly evolved into a beacon of spirituality for the larger, culturally diverse community we now call Faubourg Marigny.

Throughout its 175 year history, St. Paul has transformed and sustained its community in the face of numerous challenges. The 1800's brought fire, the misfortunes of Civil War, and the changing language from German to English. Moreover, St. Paul fearlessly ministered to the needs of yellow fever victims at all

churches in the neighborhood. In the latter 1800's, the needs of orphans in the city were addressed by organizing an orphan asylum association within the congregation; providing refuge to these children for decades. Newer challenges included the struggles and courage of the civil rights movement, another devastating church fire, and the destructive forces of major hurricanes. For many years, member volunteers tutored neighborhood children after school, providing them with academic guidance and recreational opportunities. The church building also opened a well-child clinic affording area children free immunizations. Other local programs included the creation of the first AIDS care team in the city of New Orleans, which led to an interfaith network of caregivers reaching out to every neighborhood, and a food and shelter voucher program assisting the homeless in the city with their physical needs. Furthermore, the love and appreciation of music still resonates today as St. Paul takes pride in its restored pipe organ and the St. Paul choir, offering concerts and musical events on Sundays, as well as throughout the year. And through all these years, St. Paul has successfully operated their school, serving thousands of parents and children reaching into all neighborhoods throughout the greater New Orleans area.

St. Paul is the oldest congregation in the Southern District. This year marks the 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary of God's grace and love at St. Paul, and YES...they are celebrating! The theme LOVE ALIVE@ 175 is based on I John in the 4<sup>th</sup> chapter, "We love because he first loved us." In 2015, St. Paul continues to be a shining example of God's love on the corner of Port and Burgundy. Its involvement in the neighborhood is evident and God's love is mirrored through the members who minister to the needs of people every day. St. Paul Lutheran School continues to model good Christian behavior and responsibility for its students - loving and serving our Lord through service to others. Our courtyard and halls still bustle with activity and events that bring people together celebrating and accepting our diversities and sharing our spirituality. Listen for the church bells each Sunday as they beckon all to come experience and share in worship and praise. St. Paul will continue to build upon its history of love and service to all those inside and outside its doors!

#### Grace - Destin, FL



A team of six people from Grace – Destin, FL and Mt. Olivet Methodist Church in Arlington, VA have returned from a mission trip where they participated in a program for underprivileged children at Camp Penuel located in the Esparza area of Costa Rica. The team brought school supplies, helped with craft projects, taught a chocolate chip cookie class, picked oranges and lemons for juice, trimmed trees, provided electrical expertise, and loved the children.

Grace has had an ongoing relationship with this camp since 2004, helping prepare the land for building and being present at the dedication in 2006. Yearly teams are sent during camp sessions to help as needed.

The Grace Foundation of Destin Board of Trustees is pleased to announce that \$32,500 in grants was awarded for the Fall 2014 Grant cycle to local, regional, and international initiatives. The grants recipients are listed below. The Foundation also made future commitments for support of Estonia Lutheran Minister Internship at Grace.



- 2015 Thrivent Crop Drop, Destin, FL. The Crop Drop is an event held at Grace
  Lutheran Church where 80,000 lbs. of fresh produce is sorted and packaged for
  distribution to local food banks. The Grant will be used to help purchase the produce.
- Emerald Coast Autism Center, Niceville, FL.. They will use the Grant to support constructing a new 14,500 square foot facility on the Northwest Florida State College Niceville campus.
- **S4P Synergy**, Fort Walton Beach FL. Striving for Perfection Ministries will use the Grant to help feed those in need during Thanksgiving.
- **Grace Lutheran Church** of Destin, FL. Grants will be used to support a Web Site upgrade, Pastor Kevin's mission trip to Costa Rica, and Mothers of Pre-Schooler's (MOPS).
- Evergreen Lutheran School, Detroit, MI. They will use the Grant to fund a significant shortfall of funds due to Detroit's recent financial crisis that has placed a much greater emphasis on private donations.
- **Mission Love Seeds**, Destin, FL. They will use the Grant to fund a fresh water well for 1,800 children and adults in the village of Bondo, Kenya. Bondo currently only has access to contaminated water from a nearby dam, ditches, or small man-made lakes. The well will be dug by hand and take two months to complete.
- **Grace Music Grant**, Destin, FL. The Grant will be used to both support young singers and musicians, and to enhance the praise and worship ministry of Grace Lutheran Church. The Grant is used for instruments and music lessons.
- Clarkston International Bible Church, Atlanta, GA. The Grant will be for supplies and athletic equipment for Clarkston International Student Ministry supporting refugee children in Atlanta.
- First Lutheran Church, Florala, AL. The Grant will be used for several major repairs to the church Parsonage, a sound system to support a new organ, and a new refrigerator to be used in the Church's Community Food Pantry.
