How marvelous is our God! Because of his love for us, the creator of the universe stoops to the earth to make covenants with his creation. The season of Lent stands as a reminder to us that God's love remains steadfast, even though we so often break faith with him. For many, Lent is a time for soul searching and self-examination, dedicated to facing up to those places where we have failed to keep the covenant.

Far from being a melancholy season of selfabsorption with sin, Lent offers us an opportunity to behold the wonder of God's love. Through the Psalms we can join David, who looked to God for strength, preservation, and salvation based on God's promise to all those who seek to keep his covenant. With Noah we can embrace the God who preserves those who serve him and who set his bow in the sky as a continuing sign of his covenant. We can join Peter who celebrated the truth of the new covenant, whereby Christ died to conquer faithlessness, bringing both the dead and the living into a new relationship with God. We need to rehearse Mark's gospel story of Jesus' baptism and temptation in the wilderness, remembering that "we have not a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who is every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sinning" (Heb. 4:15). Though we fail, Christ, our Savior, has done all things well. Lent is truly a season for rejoicing in the wonder of God's love toward

Father as we enter this season of Lent, may no sacrifice, but that of Jesus our Savior, absorb our hearts. May the immeasurable love evident in your promises throughout the ages strengthen us to be keepers of the covenant. Amen

Asian Mission in the Southern District–LCMS --- One Disciple, One Neighbor at a Time

On 28 August 1963, Martin Luther King delivered his famous speech "I Have a Dream" to the Americans. More than 50 years later, his dream has become a reality in many walks of life, i.e., education, government, corporations. However, King's Dream has yet transformed the Christian churches in America. especially the Lutheran churches. are People of color still underrepresented, less than 5 percent, in the LCMS tribe.

Whether our Lutheran tribe accepts King's Dream or not is not an issue, we can no longer continue to move our church campuses away from the inner city to avoid people of color. Whether we like it or not, people of color are increasingly present in the suburban areas many of metropolitan cities, just to name a few: Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Houston, Los Angeles, New York City, Seattle, and New Orleans. Denial and flight will no longer work to keep the churches open.

Moreover, America has become a mission field in the globalized world. In addition, with the growing population of Asians and Latinos throughout the United States, especially in the southern states, the harvest is blooming in the next five to ten years. Pew Research

Center's statistics reported that the total population changes in 2013 by natural increase for Asians is 39%, and by international migration is 61% increase (an equivalent percent or higher for Latino); and the population is increasing at a rate of 5%, for both Asian and Latino population. Hence, our ways of doing mission and ministry, our priorities for determining budgets and planning, our worldview and presuppositions of constructing theologies and forming church policies, and our "yesterday Christianity" must be changed in the changing "face of Christianity" in America (as Philip Jenkins and Peter Phan would label the current trend). What will be boiled down for the Lutheran tribe is either change or face extinction in the 21st Century.

During the New Year holiday, I had a chance to attend a Multiply Retreat organized by the Rev. Dr. David Kim, LINC Houston. The men and women who attended the retreat agreed that the attraction and addition model of doing outreach are not working for the ethnic communities, especially for the Latino and Asian communities. Together with the Gospel urgency (for the harvest is ripe and the Kingdom of God is at hand), only the multiply model is viable: "go and make disciples of all nations" one–on–one. Imagine the explosion of discipleship making in America if each Lutheran family would reach out to its neighbors who are living next door in the next 12 months—then in turn its neighbors would make disciples to his or her adjacent neighbors.

I envision if only 3–5 families in every Lutheran congregation embrace this multiply method of making disciples, the church's mission would explode in the Southern District in about ten years. What would happen if 3–5 families in every Lutheran congregation located in New Orleans, Baton Rouge, Lafayette, Biloxi, Mobile, or Pensacola committed to build a relationship with their Asian or Vietnamese neighbors? Why wouldn't we want to know who are our neighbors: their names, their children, their jobs, their health and their life issues? Your presence in your neighborhood is the seed of the Gospel to those who do not yet believe in Jesus Christ. God has sown the Gospel seed in your neighborhood. In other words, you are God's bearers of the Gospel to your neighbors.

In the next several months, I will actively seeking your help in reaching out to your neighbors: your prayers and your connection with your neighbors. We all are partners in building our Father's Kingdom. It is our baptismal responsibility to reach out to our neighbors and make disciples.
